D. COMMUNICATING PARCEL TAX EXEMPTION OPTIONS TO PROPERTY OWNERS – Mr. McDonald reviewed the background on the Parcel Tax measures that were on the ballots in spring 2005 and fall 2012. The district wrote into the ballot language stated that parcel tax exemptions would be granted for properties otherwise exempt from property taxes, for Senior Citizens 65 years of older who occupy their property as their principal residence and for persons who receive Supplemental Security Income for disability, regardless of age, who occupy their property as their primary residence. The ballot language of Measure K in 2012 states that the District shall manage the exemptions, refund, reduction, or re-computation of the Parcel Tax. Mr. McDonald introduced Mr. Bill Wadsworth, community member. Mr. McDonald reported that Mr. Wadsworth requested the district consider refunding his parcel tax payments since he first qualified for the parcel tax exemption and he believes that seniors are not being adequately informed of the parcel tax exemption. This item is discussion and administration would like direction from the Board. A discussion took place regarding:

- Notification of informing disabled and elderly people
- 87 people are exempt and there are 4,210 that could be exempt
- Look at the demographics, and the population in this county, the population will be getting older
- Notifying seniors is the right thing to do
- Good idea to add exemption information on the bill
- Based on board discussion no retroactive reimbursements
- Communicate without spending lots of money
- Public notices in the paper and possibly time with property taxes
